MIZRACHI SUGGESTS CAUTION IN RED HUNTS

ATLANTIC CITY, Nov. 8—The Mizrachi Organization of America told Congressional investigating committees today to avoid "wounding or humiliating man made in the image of God" or face condemnation by religious opinion.

Eight hundred delegates representing 70,000 religious Zionists in this country, took this position in a resolution adopted at the closing session here of the group's thirty-third annual convention.

The resolution said the organization did not "question the urgent need of relentless exposure of the Kremlin's agents," but it recommended caution in the search for subversives.

Another resolution expressed the delegates' "grief and despair at lack of Federal action to refine or replace the existing immigration policy of the United States as embodied in the McCarran-Walter Act, which has been indicted by every fair-minded authority as discriminatory and exclusionist in its purpose and effect."

Referring to relations between Israel and the United States, the delegates asserted in a resolution that the Near East problem could be solved only if it was made clear that the United States and the United Nations "are not bent on a punitive expedition" in the debate scheduled to be resumed soon in the Security Council on border tensions.

Rabbi Mordecai Kirshblum of Brooklyn was re-elected to his second term as national Mizrachi president. The following were named honorary presidents: Dr. B.
