High German Official Involved in Nazi Program to Exterminate Jews

KIEL — (JTA) — An investigation into the Nazi past of Hans-Alois Adasch, former Deputy Minister President of Schleswig-Holstein, was underway here. Dr. Hans Duhrie, a spokesman for the Kiel office, said he would be charged with probe will seek to learn whether Adasch should be charged with participation in the Nazi program to exterminate European Jews.

He reported that evidence in data had been turned over to the office of the Kiel state prosecutor but declined to give any details.

Adasch, a co-founder of a German Refugee party, became state minister for Welfare Affairs in 1950, a post he held until 1957. He was also Deputy Minister President from 1954 to 1957 and is now manager of a housing firm. He joined the Nazi party in 1933 and held posts with the Nazi labor front and the German government. Details about his wartime career have never been disclosed.

The original draft presented to the Council at its second session last year but not acted on — repudiated the desire to charge specifically. However, this draft was withdrawn as a result of the intervention of conservative theologians of the Roman Church.

Subsequently, the draft was considerably revised, stating only that the Jews of "our time" are responsible and eliminating use of the word "decide." In addition, the revised draft contained what many Jewish leaders regard as an unfortunate statement in the Church's traditional hope for the conversion of Jews to Christianity. The text of the revised draft was published in the United States on Sept. 3, and reached off a storm of criticism.

Calhoun Organ Leads Solovitch Stand on Vatican Draft BOSTON — (JTA) — The views of Rabbi Joseph B. Solovitch, respected leader of American Orthodoxy at the Vatican, are lauded in the current issue of the Pilot, official organ of the Archdiocese of Boston, which declared:

"Baptists are proud to have as one of the religious leaders in this area the world-famous rabbinical scholar, Dr. Joseph Solovitch. His presence is not limited to his own Orthodox Jewish community, for his wise and sensitive perceptions very often have a universal application. 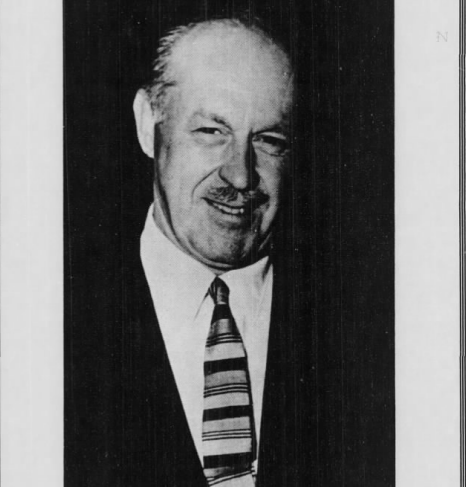
